

Canon Leslie Virgo, Rector to St. Martins of Tours, Chelsfield 1974 - 2011

January 9th 2011 celebrated the end of 37 years at Chelsfield with a final farewell buffet for our Rector, Leslie Virgo

Internet Scam

Please be aware of a massive fraudulent email campaign using what seems to be stolen email addresses. The user is asked to click on a link to download a PDF-related software package or update. Most appear to concern Adobe and have a subject beginning with: "News Releases : Up-

grade New Adobe Acrobat Reader 2011" These emails link back to one of a number of malicious websites seeking the user to install software that ultimately tries to steal personal details and credit card numbers. It is the nature of these types of attacks that the websites concerned

change frequently so you will need to be vigilant, so please do NOT click on any link in an email unless you are confident of its validity. Normal software updates are not usually delivered by email, and this is a classic approach adopted by fraudsters.

Bromley Borough Met Police Commander

Extracts from January 2011 Newsletter

In the past year we have responded to over 106,220 calls from the public, with over 9,750 being emergencies. We arrested over 8,500 people and have investigated over 22,230 crimes. Tragically we dealt with 3 fatal collisions on our roads. Who says we are not busy?

For the first time we finished the year with more officers than when we started. This has been a luxury, enabling us to have a larger pro-active team to target prolific offenders and to provide a greater presence in our Town Centres at night. Unfortunately, those numbers will decline as the freeze on recruitment starts to bite. But don't worry; we've done well over the past 5 years and I see no reason for that to change.

It may not be important to everyone, but achieving all our corporate targets is how the MPS measures me. In that respect, Bromley is a success again.

We finished the last year with huge crime reductions and some excellent detection rates. The downward trend in crime and disorder has continued. Again we are showing some of the biggest crime reductions in London. We have successfully prosecuted some really prolific burglars, thieves and violent people. It is rewarding to see some of them receive custodial sentences. We know that when certain prolific thieves are incarcerated, crime does go down. It also gives respite to victims and the community. It gives us time to concentrate on those who have been released and start re-offending; the

revolving door of the justice system.

Last year I urged people to lock their front doors when they go out or go to bed, and not to leave their car keys by the front door. Sadly, so many people ignored, and continue to ignore this simple advice. We have arrested several teams of burglars who are prolific with this type of crime. They tell us how easy it is for them. They see a nice car on the drive, they find an unlocked UPVC front door, and the car keys conveniently left for them. Please don't make it so easy. We could reduce burglary so significantly if people heeded this advice. Please try harder in 2011.

Safer Neighbourhoods (SNH) is currently being reviewed across the MPS. The current SNH structure of Bromley reflects the complexities of

the borough and the difficulties of policing a large geography that ranges from dense urban areas to remote rural communities. This is the model of policing that has attracted overwhelming political, partner and community support. It has been the vehicle for delivering consistent and sustainable crime and disorder reduction in Bromley over the past 5 years. The size of some of Bromley's wards is significant (Darwin Ward is three times the size of Kensington and Chelsea borough for example) and the current SNTs are an integral part of the local community and provide a policing presence, response, and reassurance across vast areas.

The MPA has invested in 14 Safer Neighbourhood bases; purpose built to MPA and MPS specification that are bespoke to the wards that they serve. Additionally, the Town Centre Team has a base located within the Glades Shopping Centre provided by Capital Shopping Centres. Bromley is the only borough in the MPS with its total estate fit for purpose. The bases have

leases that range from 2015 to 2026. The bases enable the teams to have a local policing presence in remote parts of the borough providing community reassurance and tackling local issues of crime and disorder. I believe that to remove bases from the more remote parts of the borough would be disastrous, returning to where we were before we introduced SNH's; communities feeling isolated, unsafe and ignored.

As your Borough Commander, I welcome the opportunity to build on the success of Safer Neighbourhoods in Bromley and to review and re-shape how we deliver this style of policing.

It is important to me that the model we design meets the needs of the people we serve. We have achieved significant success in Bromley with the current model even though it has been a 'one size fits all' structure. Now that we have the freedom to change this, I believe we can be even better. My intention is to retain the same bases ensuring our teams are located close to their communi-

ties. The review will include extensive consultation and engagement. The role of the community, partner agencies and key stakeholders in this process is crucial.

Temporary Traffic Order

Warren Road, Chelsfield

In order that a Thames Water connection can be made, it will be necessary to close Warren Road to through traffic between it's junctions with

Chelsfield Lane and Court Road.

Displaced traffic will be diverted via:- Court Road, Church Road, Chelsfield Lane and Avalon Road. Access to properties will be maintained as far as is

practicable from either side of the closure as appropriate.

Work is due to commence on Monday 31st January 2011 and is expected to take five days to complete.

Forthcoming Works A21 Hewitts Roundabout

10th Jan-18th Feb 2011

Street lighting works mainly involving ducting and cabling.

(Majority of works will be night time but works off the carriageway will take place during day time).

14th - 25th March 2011

(nights only) – Carriageway resurfacing works to be followed by antiskid about 4 weeks later.

1) Ducting works on Hewitts Road

A road closure will be required at Hewitts entry /

exit from Hewitts Road and traffic will be diverted via Church Road, Bucks Cross Road, Maypole Road and vice versa.

2) Ducting works on the A224 Court Road northbound exit from the roundabout

A road closure will be required on the northbound exit from the roundabout to enable some ducting works to be carried out

Traffic intending to exit the roundabout joining the A224 Court Road towards

Orpington will be diverted via A21 Sevenoaks Road, A223 High Street, A223 Sevenoaks Road and A232 Spur Road.

3) Ducting works on Wheatsheaf Hill

A road closure will be required at the entry / exit into Hewitts Road and traffic will be diverted via A224 Orpington By-Pass, Old London and vice versa.

4) Ducting works on A224 Orpington By-Pass exit from the roundabout

A road closure will be required on the southbound exit from the roundabout to enable some ducting

works to be carried out. Traffic intending to exit the roundabout joining the A224 Orpington By-Pass

towards Sevenoaks will be diverted via A21 Sevenoaks Road, Old London Road and vice versa

Beware - Postal Scam

Can you circulate this around - it has been confirmed by Royal Mail. The Trading Standards Office are making people aware of the following scam:

A card is posted through your door from a company called PDS (Parcel Delivery Service) suggesting that they were unable to deliver a parcel and that you need to contact them on 0906

6611911 (a Premium rate number).

DO NOT call this number, as this is a mail scam originating from Belize.

If you call the number and you start to hear a recorded message you will already have been billed £15 for the phone call.
