The practicalities of inviting so many people to a tiny village like Chelsfield are uppermost in our minds at this time and keeping the roads running as smoothly as possible is the most im-

portant aspect. The worst bottleneck we get is in Church Road and it can grind to a complete standstill if there are any cars parked outside the cottages between the Court Road junction and the Skibbs Lane junction - the road is just SO narrow. I have written to all the affected residents but I would like to take this opportunity to grovel and scrape once again to those who normally park their cars on Warren Road and Church Road to move their car to our residents' car park in the field behind the Five Bells by the evening of 8th July. We will be co-

We have other areas for residents to park if they do not want to use the Exhibitors/ Residents car park but if you have any problems or misgivings, please contact me to resolve them, rather than just leave your car blocking the road. Beware! Another Scam

I received a call from a 'representative' of BT, informing me that he was dis-connecting me because of an unpaid bill. He demanded payment immediately of £31.00 or it would be £118.00 to re-connect at a later

date..

The guy wasn't even fazed when I told him I was with Virgin Media, allegedly.

VM have to pay BT a percentage for line rental!
I asked the guy's name -

he gave me the very 'English' John Peacock with a very 'African' accent - & phone number - 0800 0800 152.

Obviously the fellow realized I didn't believe his story, so offered to demonstrate that he was



from BT. I asked how & he told me to hang up & try phoning someone - he would dis-connect my phone to prevent this.

AND HE DID !!

My phone was dead - no engaged tone, nothing - until he phoned me again.

Very pleased with himself, he asked if that was enough proof that he was with BT. I asked how the payment was to be made and he said credit card, there and then.

I said that I didn't know how he'd done it, but I had absolutely no intention of paying him, I didn't believe his name or that he worked for BT.

I dialed 1471 - number withheld

He hung up.

I phoned his fictitious 0800 number - not recognized., so I phoned the police to let them know. I wasn't the first! It's only just started apparently, but it is escalating.

Their advice was to let as many people as possible know of this scam. The fact that the phone does go off would probably convince some people it's real, so please make as many friends & family aware of this.

How is it done?

This is good but not that clever. He gave the wrong number - it should have been 0800 800 152 which takes you through to BT Business.

The cutting off of the line is very simple, he stays on the line with the

mute button on and you can't dial out - but he can hear you trying (This is because the person who initiates a call is the one to terminate it). When you stop trying he cuts off and immediately calls back.

You could almost be convinced!

The sad thing is that it is so simple that it will certainly fool the elderly and vulnerable.

By the way this is not about getting the cash as this would not get past merchant services - it is all about getting the credit card details which include the security number so that it can be used for far larger purchases.

The Big Lunch



As with last year, this was part of a national community event. Unfortunately this year rain stopped this being an outside event in the rectory garden, so all 40+ participants squashed into the parish room for

their lunch. (Is this a record?). A range of delicious puddings were provided by volunteers. Fortunately the weather improved later, allowing the younger members to play games in the garden, and allowing more space to move around and chat. Despite the unfavourable weather, this was again an enjoyable event. Thanks to Anne Mead and her team for organising the event.

Preliminary Meeting About the Village Clean-Up Day

Prior to the Village clean up day, two members of the Chelsfield Village Society committee, Pam Ames and I, met up with Jim Raggett, Bromley Council's Area Monitoring Officer. We walked around the village and decide what jobs the volunteers could realistically do, and what could be considered work that Bromley council should deal with.



It was interesting for Mr Raggett to see how long it has been since some of our pavements had been swept. The Autumn leaves were rapidly turning into leafmould. He pointed out that the grass verge outside lvy Cottages is supposed to be edged with a concrete strip. This has become overgrown but the council will arrange for it to be neatened up. We also identified some dead branches which had been broken off by passing tall vehicles and were in danger of falling onto passers by. As the hedges and trees are not cut back often enough overgrown and overhanging branches impede pedestrians and are often

broken off by lorries.

The pond in Bucks Cross Road next to the children's playground is on the Council's to do list as it needs to cope with flood water and we were advised that any work at the road side would need partial road closure for safety reasons. Mr Raggett said he would organise what hedgerow trimming and pavement clearing he could before our clean up day. Any remaining cutting back could be carried out by our volunteers and bagged up for removal.

The bus shelter is frequently swept by volunteers but soon fills up with wind blown rubbish.

Moss on the tarmac of the children's playground was building up and Mr Raggett said he would supply scrapers for us to use. A walk around the field showed very little litter but it is well worth clearing.

A useful contact has been made and we will make use of it in the future.

Jim Raggett was as good as his word and, prior to the clean up day council employees gave the village a "deep clean". The pavements were cleared, overgrown branches were trimmed back and verges strimmed. Would we find enough to do on the day?

Property Marking

The local Constabulary duly arrive on the 18th June 2011 at the Cricket Pavilion to mark property and goods brought along. (Thanks to David Lambert and the Cricketer members for allowing us to use the premises and for David staying for the duration, and thanks for the attendance by the Con-

Remember if your property is not marked, if it is stolen and they recover it, then the police have no idea who it belongs to, so you will never

get it back!

Hopefully, arrangements were set in place to have a lot of horse tack marked in the near future.

We did find out that all stolen property the police recover, is passed into a an ultra violet room where, if it has been marked with an appropri-



ate pen with your post code, then your address can be identified and the property would be returned to the owner. These pens are readily available, and I would urge you to mark your property, especially things that are easily lost or stolen (Phones, laptops etc) The police gave me a pen, so if anybody needs to borrow it, please get in touch.

Bromley Council Reopen Green Waste Sites

Bromley's green garden waste sites have reopened for the gardening season.

Five temporary sites operate every weekend, taking grass cuttings and prunings from residents for turning into compost. These sites save gardeners having to travel and queue at the busy permanent sites in Waldo Road, Bromley and Churchfields Road, Beckenham.

The free local sites are

open each Saturday from 11am to 4pm and Sunday from 8am to 12 noon and will be available until November 27th at:

- Beckenham, Unicorn Primary School (Creswell Drive off South Eden Park Road)
- Biggin Hill, Charles Darwin School (Jail Lane)
- Bromley, Norman Park (Hook Farm Road entrance off Bromley Common, A21)

- Green Street Green, Salt Depot (Shire Lane 'spur', off Sevenoaks Road)
- St Paul's Cray, Cotmandene Crescent car park (off Chipperfield Road)

To use the temporary sites, you will need to show your waste permit or proof of residence such as a recent utility bill. Please be aware that garden waste is not accepted outside operating hours.

Snow Conference Report

I attended the 'Snow Conference' held on 15th June in Bromley Council's Offices.

The meeting was well attended by representatives of many of the

Borough's Residents Associations and Societies.

We were told that Bromley Council are already planning for next winter. There is 7000 tons of salt stored at the Shire Lane Depot so that if necessary 500 miles of Road including 26 transport interchanges and primary



footways can be gritted during the period November to April.

The Council have 9 dedicated gritters, 6 demountable gritters and can call on local farmers who have snow ploughs fitted to tractors.

During question time Dan Jones was grilled over the problems caused by the early snow fall in 2010 which resulted in main roads grinding to a halt. He admitted that all main roads were not gritted soon enough but explained that the snow was so widespread it was difficult to achieve this particularly once the snow had fallen and gritters were hampered by the volume of slow moving traffic.

Other complaints were that side roads, secondary footways, school playgrounds and day care centres etc. were not cleared of snow. Given the size of the Borough it was emphasised that this was not possible.

However, the Council is setting up a Web Site which will give information on the snow forecast and the Council's action. Following on from this Cllr Fortune spoke about becoming a Snow Friend i.e. individuals who agreed to be responsible for an area of footway or road outside their own property and this was encouraged by the Council

The guest Speaker, Ian Smith, who is a Snow Friend explained how he organised a local group by planning what was needed in his immediate area and knowing who his Snow Friends were.

So if you would like to

become a Snow Friend give your name, address or email and phone no. to any CVS Committee member. You will receive a FREE bag of salt and a Snow Shovel

The Council are also looking for Street Friends i.e. people who care about the street and area where they live and are willing to look out for problems and report them to the Council or organise a clean up.

The Village Clean up day was a positive result of this and our determination to have a clean and safe Village and as reported elsewhere in the VV we received great support from Bromley Council.

So I repeat 'Could you be a Snow Friend or a Street Friend or both?'

Letter From Councillor Julian Grainger

In the June Newsletter one item caught my eye.

"There has been an increase in street rubbish

bins being filled wit domestic rubbish due to the fortnightly collection. It is costing the council more

to empty these bins regularly and it may be costing

more than having a weekly collection."

Firstly – every house has a **weekly** visit for waste – with a different mix collected each week: (Flats are still being planned)

Week 1 - food, paper,

glass, metal, plastic

Week 2 – food, paper, residual (non-recyclable) waste

Weight collected borough wide **April 2011** (excl. flats)

- recyclables 1367 tonnes
- non-recyclabes 1430 tonnes
- street sweeping (including street bins) = 612 tonnes (vs 641 tonnes April 2010)

So – there is no boroughwide transfer of residual waste to street bins showing in the data.

However some bins to

seem to fill faster than others – and if there is a localised problem around Chelsfield please let me know or contact the head of street services

With landfill at £48 per tonne (and going up) any increase in collections from a few street bins would be massively outweighed by the savings in landfill tax from the increase in recycling from the weekly collections.

Full data on waste collections is available on request.
