The Chiffchaff / Willow Warbler

This month I am going to talk about two birds. The reason being that the Chiffchaff and Willow warbler (CC/WW) are almost indistinguishable from each other ! One could say that the most prominent feature of these birds is that they have no obvious distinguishing features!! When I have seen these birds in the past I have usually assumed that they are female sparrows of some kind – or something. Yet in reality sparrows of all kinds have far more features to hang labels on. In fact these birds are so similar that they were not properly identified as separate species until the 18th century along with another species, the Wood warbler which is rarer and can also be easily confused with the CC/WW. One more confusion to add to the pot is the Garden warbler which looks similar and arguably has even fewer features! Proberably the best means of separating the two birds is by the colour of the legs. The Chiffchaff has dark legs

while the Willow warbler has light coloured legs. This may all sound as if

but both have very 'clean' lines with the wil-

low warbler being somewhat more svelte. The Chiffchaff gets its name from its call while the Willow warbler's call is more musical and sometimes this can be the best means of separating them.

These birds have a number of local names – *ground wren*, *nettle bird* and *golden wren* (I told you it had a touch of yellow) for the Willow warbler and *Pettychap* and *Chip-chop* for the Chiff-

chaff.

For many years I've caught quick flashes of an unidentified bird in my garden and wondered what it was. It was only after a good clear look that I was able to commit features to memory and then search out the particular species in my reference books. On this occasion it seems that the bird I had seen was a Willow Warbler but it did take a number of addi-

tional sightings to check on the colour of the legs ! My garden is the only place that I have ever seen this/these birds but both are common, yet generally not properly identified. So if you should see a small, light brown/lemony coloured generally featureless bird around your garden the chances are that it's a Chiffchaff or willow warbler.

Cervical Screening Awareness

Consultant gynaecologists at BMI Chelsfield Park Hospital are urging women in the local community to make sure they are up to date with their smear test following the recent Cervical Screening Awareness Week. Recent figures have shown that 20 per cent^[i] of women still do not attend their cervical screening. The consultant's support of the campaign aims to raise awareness and educate the local community to the risks associated with cervical cancer, which takes nearly 1,000^[ii] lives each year in the UK. Women aged 25 to 49 are invited to attend for cervical screening every three years; those aged 50 to 64 are invited every five years.

Miss Sally Watkinson, Consultant Gynaecologist at BMI Chelsfield Park Hospital comments: "I often see the effect this disease has on my patients and their families and each week I see women who have missed routine smear tests or avoided them altogether. We are very concerned that some women are not attending

this vital cancer screening test. Early detection of changes to the cells of the cervix can be easily picked up and treated following a routine smear test. Sometimes I see patients present themselves with symptoms at a late

early detection and prevention. Cervical cancer is the most common cancer in the UK for women aged 20-29^[iii] and the second most common cancer in women under 35 years old^[iv], yet women do not seem to take the neces-

stage but treatment is much more successful if changes are detected early. It is just as important for younger women to attend as they are just as much at risk as older women. This is why I am urging women in Chelsfield to educate themselves to the important role smear tests play in

sary precautions to minimise and prevent the risk of developing the disease. The smear test for cervical cancer only takes a few minutes every three to five years but it is vital in protecting women, saving families from heartbreak and sometimes preventing avoidable deaths."

The Gentle Art of The One Man Show

A few years back I decided in a fit of pique that I would write and perform in a One Man Show, Sitting on a beach in Devon one summer the idea came to me. I would play all the characters, write the script, sing any songs and perform my music. An egotistical extravaganza the success or failure of which could only depend on one person – ME! Having persuaded my lovely wife Jayne that I would not make a fool of either her or myself I set about cobbling together a melange of acts that would last about 2 hours (much harder than you think). Most of the characters would be borrowed from plays that I had been cast in in the Chelsfield Players, which I had particularly enjoyed. The original script would be adapted to my own weird sense of humour. Interspersed with these acts would be music performed either on the piano, keyboard or accordion. Over my life I had written some 20 pieces of music and songs apart for a couple of pan-

tomime scores. It would be a chance to air these in public and learn to play them without mistakes (bashing them out on a pub piano over a pint or two, to an inebriated but enthusiastic audience is not the same as 50 seated, ticket paying punters). And so the idea began to grow until I had a programme. I had settled on several core characters,



male and female: Leonard Trotter – an extremely boring but well mean-



ing soul who loved showing countless colour slides of obscure subjects viz *Cast Iron Drain Covers of Southern England*, *Housebricks*; *Municipal Street Signs*. Molly Trolley- a char lady who's party piece was to play Tea for Two at the piano with a paper bag on her head. Lavinia Gibson – the headmistress of Grangewood School for Girls which became the main framework for the show and who had a saucy side to her distant past (pinched from *Daisy Pulls it Off* where I played her for real), Colonel Melchett – a retired army officer intent on restoring a sense of law and order and common decency back into the world of indiscipline, chaos as he saw it. And Archy D'Arcy, a loveable spiv who would encourage the audience to indulge in old fashioned street songs and buy some of his dodgy goods. There would be very quick changes between characters at times where I fought bravely with tight trousers, tights

and girdles, padded bras and wigs, earrings etc and makeup and a whole collection of stage props ably supplied from the wings by Jayne and Ann. Sound effects and lighting by good friend Norman Bailey.

Over 2 years I gave 6 performances, two in one day which was exhaust-

ing. Mostly for charity. It was a very satisfying experience and a good test of stage presence when things went wrong – like the time all the slides fell out of the magazine on to the stage. Get out of that then!

All the props and costumes are still in their boxes and who knows? I

might revive them having become very attached to them, albeit that I doubt whether I am size 16 anymore! If you are ever REALLY short of some entertainment for something then give me a bell. I might still be able to ring it.

Ladies Day - A Review

Summer can always a difficult time to put on amateur productions due to members other commitments, but this production, although small in cast numbers, and with two of the men taking on five minor roles between them, stood out as one of Chelsfield Players better recent productions.

Set in 2005, the year that Royal Ascot was relocated to York, four lady fish packers get tickets for a day out for Ladies day at Royal Ascot, for a drink, a flirt and a flutter.

The scene change from fish factory to Ascot is done very cleverly, with all changes to cast and scene

done with all cast on stage, (and all to the sounds of Tony Christie's Amarillo). All the characters of the four leads were well defined, all had secrets that became apparent during the Ascot scenes, and all was resolved by the end. Women may be the main characters, but it's men who dominate their thinking in this play. Drunk scenes for women are always slightly problematic on stage, but Judy Ives does well with the inebriated Jan.

It becomes apparent that the real catalyst for the drama is not the fact of Pearl leaving work but the wedding of a colleague,

some time before the action of the play. Some of the Ascot frocks and hats were last worn then, and certain relationships were either initiated or began their dissolution then.

The scene where racing pundit taught the girls to tick-tack was memorably slick and another notable scene was where a jockey (Patrick) was describing to Linda his only winning race.

The various accents were sustained well throughout. In all a very enjoyable evening's entertainment, and with a happy ending thanks to Tony Christie.

new station will be on view and Brigade staff will be present to answer any questions you have.

Orpington was built in 1958 and has served the community well but it now needs modernising. A new fire station will provide facilities and accommodation suitable for a 21st century fire

and rescue service and include the provision of a new meeting room for use by local community groups. There will also be a much needed training facility on site.

The Brigade is currently preparing a detailed planning application for the rebuilding of Orpington on its existing site.

This will be funded as part of a £57 million Private Finance Initiative to build nine new fire stations for London. For more information contact:
