White Admiral Butterfly

Last summer while on the lane back to Chelsfield from Shoreham I saw a White Admiral butterfly (*Limenitis camilla*) and thought what a striking colour scheme it has. When settled the adults are unmistakable with the uppersides of their wings being black with broad white bands. By contrast the undersides are in complete contrast with a mix of black, white and brown. The manner in which it flies is not typical of most butterflies as it tends to glide more than most and for this reason its closest relatives are known as 'gliders' on the continent.

This butterfly can be found primarily in the region defined by a line running from the Bristol channel to the Humber estuary although isolated colonies exist outside this area. This is one of those species that has had an improvement in its fortunes in the last century and during this time its distribution has spread out from southern England. It may be that global warming has allowed the species to

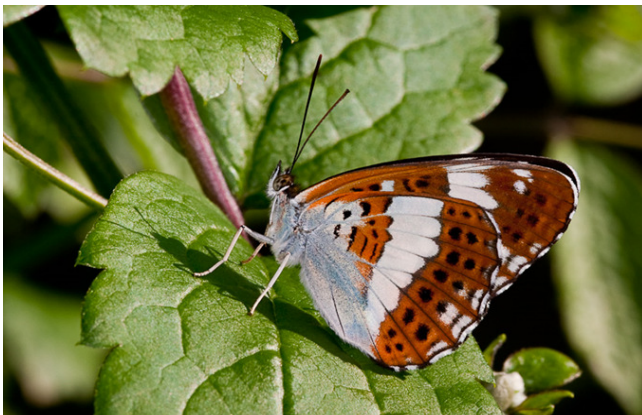
thrive at sites that had previously been too cool

of its larvae. Almost any type of woodland is



or the cessation of coppicing, that has been detrimental to so many woodland butterflies, has benefited this species

suitable as long as honeysuckle is available. The adults feed on honeydew, betony, thistles and brambles. In



which requires honeysuckle growing in shady woodland for the successful development

fact their wings can become very tatty when spending too much time on brambles probing for

nectar.

The caterpillar associated with this butterfly is one of those peculiar types that looks as if it would be more at home in a tropical setting (see photo).

While on the subject of butterflies I'm reminded of a time I was hiking in the Canadian Rockies. I had just rinsed a piece of clothing in a stream and had left it on a rock to dry in the sun. Very quickly a butterfly settled on it to feast on the residue salt still on the clothing. I took a photo of it and decided to try to identify the species when I got home. To my surprise while looking up this butterfly on the internet I found there were many almost identical species which only an expert could separate. Each was associated with a different mountain range



(from memory these were the likes of Kananaskis, Jasper and Sundance). Many of these ranges were in close proximity to each other and it seemed that the process of speciation was taking place. This is the process whereby one species, divided by a natural barrier such as mountains or rivers causes small groups of that species to become genetically isolated. Once this happens the

group begins to evolve away from its mother group until interbreeding is no longer possible and a new species is born. But I digress. The white admiral is less common than the better known red admiral and its colours are not as vibrant but they are striking in their bold contrast. So keep an eye out for them in the next couple of months when they are most likely to be seen.

Last Post on Windsor Drive

Dennis and Leonie Penny are to shut up shop at the Chelsfield post office in Windsor Drive after 12 years behind the counter there. The exact date of its closure is unknown but is likely to be before the

end of August. The popular subpostmaster and his wife have been hit by a triple whammy. Many services carried out by post offices for the government have been taken away in re-

cent years, parking restrictions at Windsor Drive have affected custom and the Pennys' landlord has obtained a court order for repossession. He wants to sell the flat above the shop which

has been the couple's home since they took over the post office after leaving South Africa in 2001.

As traditional services dwindled, Post Office Ltd's "transformation team" pressed Dennis, aged 67, to turn his business into a "local" – essentially a limited service consisting of an open post office counter within a shop, rather than a shop attached to a post office protected by a security screen, which it considers an unviable model for modern times. But Dennis did not want

to take that option, arguing that the parade could not support another newsagent, general store or sweetshop. He calculates he would have to increase his retail business by 50% to make up the income lost by going "local".

The couple are now resigned to being both jobless and homeless before long. "We'll be out on the street, no roof over our heads, no income, no money – destitute," Dennis told Village Voice. According to Dennis, there have been some "expressions of interest"



by others in setting up a new-style "local" at the Windsor Drive shop, which has been a post office since the 1930s. But at the moment its future is uncertain.

Chelsfield Cricket Club

Did you know that Chelsfield Cricket Club is one of the oldest clubs in Kent? More of this later.

Originally the playing area was sited adjacent to St. Martins Church with the actual wicket approximately where the current layby is on Court Road.

When the by-pass (A224) was constructed in the '20's, the old ground was obliterated. However a wealthy local landowner kindly gave over some arable land from which today's ground was

created.

The Club currently play other local villages on a 'friendly' basis. There are local leagues but the small size of the club makes it difficult to be competitive in such competitions.

It is a worrying time for cricket in general as, each season, clubs in the South East disband through lack of interest and support. This seems to be associated with the fact that little cricket is now played at schools and therefore the number of

younger available players is reducing.

We at Chelsfield certainly feel that it is important to promote one of England's traditional pastimes and rue the day when no longer will be heard the sound of leather on willow in the village.

You may be aware that the Club has recently renewed the lease on the ground for a further 25 years but to continue to survive we need more support in terms of playing and non-playing membership.

If you can play, rest assured that at Chelsfield enthusiasm is much more important than skill! Phone the Captain now, number below.

Don't be worried if you haven't got all the right equipment as we will be able to kit you out for games.

Similarly, if you wish to finan-

cially support the club by being a non-playing member then please make contact with one of the officers below.

Also, if anyone wishes to hire the ground for a wedding, family picnic or private party then please contact our secretary.

So, whether you want to play, spectate or just be a

supporter of your village club then please do not hold back, do make yourself known and help maintain the village sport.

Back to the introduction, how long has cricket been played in Chelsfield?

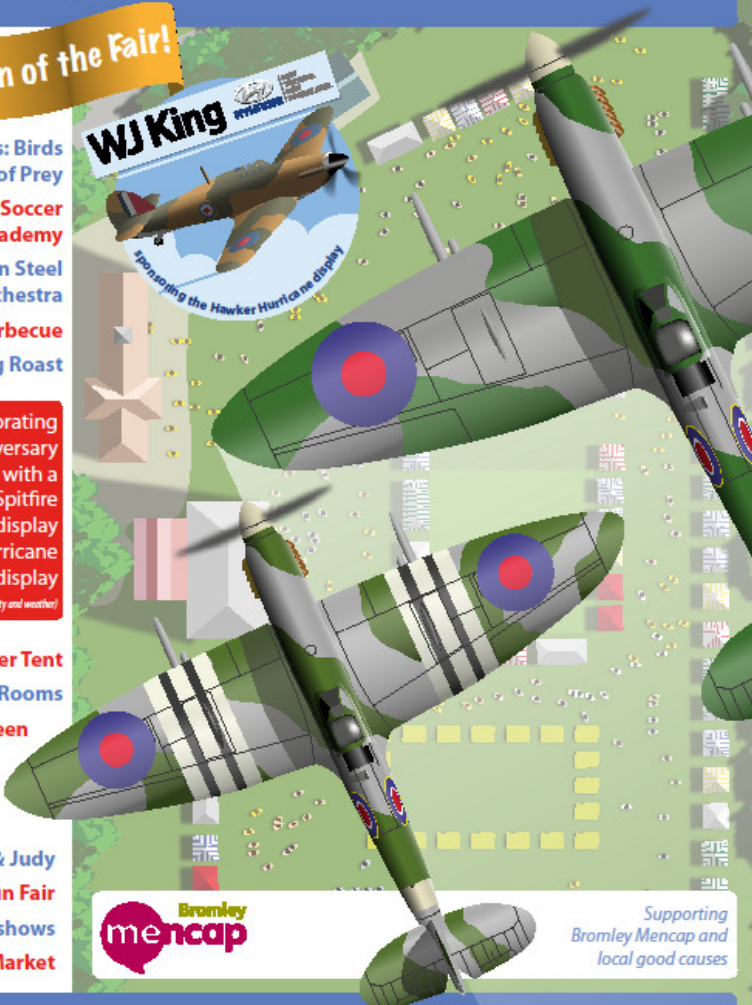

Hospital Open Day

The Princess Royal University Hospital (PRUH) is holding a community Open Day on Sunday 6 July. The free-to-attend event will take place from 11am until 3.30pm in the hospital car park.

In the first event of its kind in the borough, the PRUH is inviting Bromley residents to discover the inner workings of a busy acute hospital, and find out more about common health conditions that can affect us all.

The Open Day has been running for many years at the PRUH's sister hospital, King's College Hospital in



south London, and has regularly attracted in excess of 2,500 visitors.

King's took over the running of the PRUH in October 2013.

Chelsfield Primary School - Forest School

Those of you that walk around or across the village green, may have noticed that a clearing has been made amongst the trees and scrub on the far side of the field, and alongside the footpath.

This is the start of a 'forest school' area for our local Chelsfield Primary school. The idea of Forest Schools is to encourage

and inspire individuals of any age to appreciate and enjoy their local woodlands, and to learn and play in a woodland environment. Forest schools originated in Sweden during the 1950s, and was a way of teaching children about the natural world. The idea was adopted by Denmark as an important part of Early Years provision, and the concept was

introduced to Britain in 1995. Many other local schools are incorporating these concepts to support and enrich the National Curriculum. Apparently this area next to the field used to be allotments before it was allowed to revert to the wild. Its interesting to see this area being used for a worthwhile purpose.

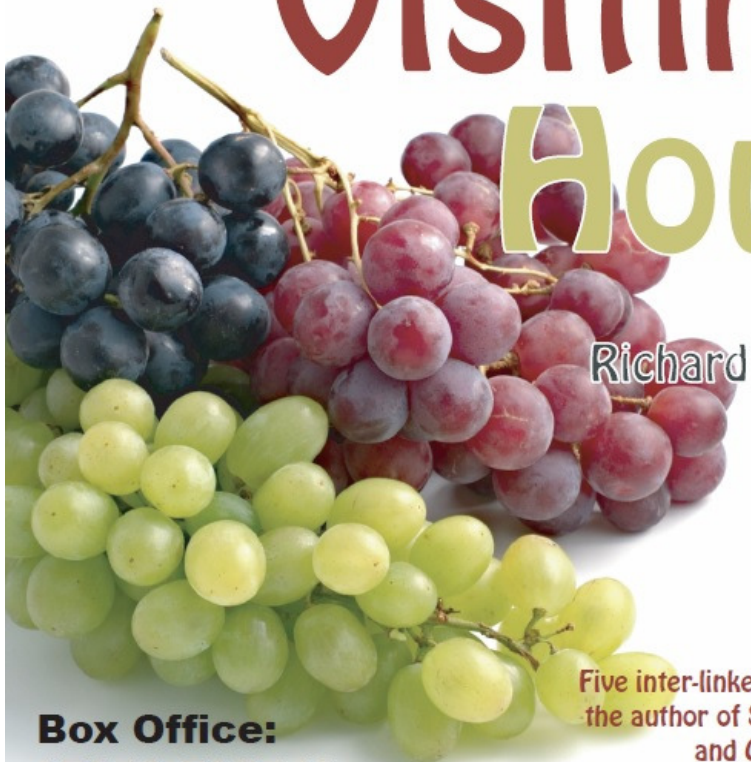

Local History Group

A colourful piece of Bromley history with special interest for Chelsfield was the topic of Patrick Hellicar's talk for the local history group at St Martin's in May entitled "The Morrell brothers – the boys who built suburbia". The Morrells arrived in our corner of Kent amid the house-building boom of the 1930s. Over a mere five or six years Morrell (Builders) Ltd transformed farmland into suburbia at Petts Wood – the Queensway side; Coney Hall, where they built 1,200 houses; part of West Wickham; and bits of Bromley, Shortlands, Southborough, Hayes and Orpington. They also developed the Castlewood Estate, off Shooters Hill at Eltham. At the end of October 1933 they turned their attention to Chelsfield, snapping up 85 acres of green fields around what became Windsor Drive from the Waring family for £8,500. They described it as "peaceful and charming" and "quiet, beautiful and healthy". By 1936 development was under way and their adverts boasted:

"You'll remember Chelsfield as the finest estate you've ever seen." Under the direction of twins Cyril and Stanley Morrell (born 1908) and their younger brother Frank, the firm's rise was meteoric. At first the trio operated as CH Morrell from their home territory of Herne Hill, in south-east London. But in 1932 they changed the firm's name to Morrell (Builders) Ltd and the next year set up HQ in Bromley High Street and began building in Hayes and Petts Wood. They kicked off at Coney Hall in 1934 and had completed 800 houses there by February 1935. Just when everything was looking rosy, Frank, now 24, was killed in an early-morning car crash just after Christmas 1933 at Beckenham Road, Clockhouse. His brothers named Franks Wood Avenue in Petts Wood as a tribute to him. Morrells are often lumped in with the "jerry builders" of the 1930s and many people think they only built semi-detached and a few detached houses, all in mock-Tudor style. But

Patrick showed they produced properties of reasonable quality that have stood the test of eight decades and are sought-after today, and that they embraced other styles. The brothers took a stand at the Ideal Home Exhibition in 1935 and displayed a flat-roofed Art Deco-style house in the "Village of the Future". The design, by architects Leslie H Kemp and Frederick E Tasker – well known for their Art Deco cinemas including the Commodore at Orpington – had won a Daily Mail prize in 1934 and Morrells offered to build it anywhere the buyer chose. Only three were built, but two are Grade Two listed and the third, in Dublin, is designated a "protected structure". Kemp & Tasker also designed a house for Cyril and his wife Pat, and it was built by Morrells in 1936 at Dorchester Drive, Herne Hill. An Art Deco dream, recently restored and with all its original features still virtually intact, it was Grade Two listed in 1997. Dorchester Court, containing 96 luxury flats in eight blocks

alongside Cyril's home, was built by Morrells in 1934 and is also listed. Generally, Morrells catered for a lower-middle-class market and in 1935 their cheapest house was a two-bedroom semi on the Old Mill Farm Estate at Orpington (behind Carlton Parade), costing £479 – mortgage repayments 11s-2d a week. In 1936 a few two-bed semis could be had at Chelsfield for £575. But Chelsfield also boasted more expensive homes – a three-bedroom detached cost £1,395. In 1935 the brothers decided to float the company on the Stock Exchange. The plan was to raise £150,000 of new money to build shops on their estates, the rents providing funds to finance further building. However, the flotation was a flop and before long Morrell (Builders) was in severe financial difficulties. A “company doctor”, Sir Harold Moore, was brought in and in January 1937 the company went into voluntary liquidation. Twelve months later, Sir Harold presented a scheme to transfer the assets of Morrell (Builders) to Morrell Estates & Development. It was approved but before

the year was out the *parent* company was also wound up. One big casualty was the Chelsfield estate. When the axe fell, only High Beeches, Spring Gardens and Warren Drive had been built, plus a few houses in Windsor Drive and Warren Road. Ultimately, Orpington Urban District Council stepped in after the Second World War and bought the site to develop the Windsor Drive estate [the subject of a talk by Patrick in June 2013 for the history group]. Morrells' troubles were multiplied by a High Court action famously known as “The Borders Case”. In 1934, Jim Borders, a London cab driver, and his wife Elsy – both Communist Party members – bought a Morrells house at Kingsway, Coney Hall, for £730 with a mortgage from The Bradford Third Equitable building society. The Bradford handed over the cash to Morrells but kept back £43 in a building societies' “pool” set up to cover any losses from mortgage defaults. Soon a catalogue of faults emerged with the house and during 1937 the Borders began withholding their mortgage repay-

ments. The Bradford sought to repossess the house but Jim and Elsy replied with a counter-claim for £500 to cover the cost of repairs they said they had to carry out. The hearing began on 13 January 1938 and lasted 18 days, Elsy handling the case herself. The Borders accused the Bradford of misrepresenting the value of their property, which they claimed was “shoddily built”, and challenged the legality of holding back part of the cost in a pool while charging interest on the full amount. In the end, the judge dismissed both the Bradford and Borders actions but gave Elsy and Jim title to their house without having to pay any more instalments. However, appeals on both sides kept the Borders case alive until a House of Lords ruling in the building societies' favour in 1941. That seemed to be the final chapter of the Morrells story. However, Patrick discovered that only days after Britain declared war on Germany in September 1939 Stan and Cyril formed a new company called Ixworth (Contractors) to build, erect, supply and deal in

“air raid shelters of every description” and to carry out land development. His research also revealed that despite Cyril being declared personally bankrupt in December 1940 and Stanley likewise in September 1941, Ixworth continued in business until the 1970s, carrying out notable building schemes at Beckenham and Billericay and property projects in many other places. Installed in a new Bromley HQ by the early 1950s, the brothers also formed a string of other active prop-

erty companies over the following decades, though all were eventually liquidated.

In 1949-50 Stanley and his wife Barbara had a new house built for them at Garden Road, backing on to the Sundridge Park, golf course, and lived there for the rest of their lives. The house was demolished recently and replaced with a larger one. Cyril and his wife, Pat, had left their stunning Art Deco house in Dorchester Drive by 1950 and in 1967 bought a sixth-floor apart-

ment in a new block overlooking the Brighton sea-front.

Stanley died in May 1979 at the age of 71 leaving an estate worth £100,000. Cyril passed away the following October, leaving £92,600. Cyril's wife died in 1982 and the Morrells' sister Winifred in 1989. None of them had children and the family fortune trickled down to Barbara, Stan's widow, who died in 2009 aged 95 and bequeathed all the Morrell money to charity.

Broadband - Have You Got a Speed Problem?

Chelsfield Village Society has been approached by Steve Barnes of Downe Residents Association regarding rural broadband speeds. This has been taken up with Jo Johnson MP, and Bromley Council.

Steve Barnes wrote: I'd like to understand if there is a problem in other parts of rural Bromley. In discussion with Catherine Gandolfi, it seems that Chelsfield have a similar problem of slow broadband speeds, and no current

prospect of getting "superfast broadband" (fibre optic technology). I'm keen to understand the problem a bit more, and it also makes sense that Chelsfield join in with Downe and Cudham in a campaign to improve things.

Therefore, I'm keen to hear from people who are experiencing slow speeds, to build an accurate picture of the problem.

To help, please go to www.speedtest.net

and check your speed (just press "begin test" then note the download and upload speed when finished). Please e-mail these (plus your exchange code - eg 01689 plus your postcode) to me at sj.barnes@btinternet.com (no personal information needed). Hopefully we can then work to get decent broadband speeds in this area - the only area in Greater London which is not yet promised them!

Progress so far

As a result of concern at residents association AGMs at Cudham and Downe, Rev John Musson and myself resolved to try to do something to improve the slow broadband speeds we are getting in the local area. The approach so far has been the following:

1 Establish the facts

By asking yourselves to supply some details of the speeds you are getting, we are building a good picture of what is

happening. The issue is on Farnborough (01689) and Biggin Hill (01959) exchanges, with a few people on Knockholt (also 01959). Farnborough and Biggin Hill are "superfast broadband" ready – but not for our area. Both Openreach (BT) and Virgin Media have confirmed they have no current plans for rolling out superfast broadband here (but Openreach certainly could do so if funded).

2 Get a Bromley Council person appointed –

we have spoken to Cll Richard Scoates and MP Jo Johnson. Both have undertaken to appoint a role in Bromley responsible for rural broadband. The Government have said that it is a Council responsibility. We would expect this person to "lead the charge" !

3 Identify sources of funding –

There are a range of options here, but we are firstly aiming for Govern-

ment grants that are available for improving rural broadband speeds around the UK. Jo Johnson has agreed to write to the Government department responsible. If we can get the money, we would ask Bromley Council to steward this money and plan for implementing solutions. So far, there has been a positive response from Jo Johnson, and we are awaiting the outcome of Bromley discussions with Stephen Carr (Leader of Bromley Council).

We are thinking through a range of alternative strategies should any of the above fail – for instance what happens if we cannot get a Government grant (next step is to press for Bromley funding).

Hopefully we can then work to get decent broadband speeds in this area - to quote Jo Johnson "I agree it is completely unacceptable that areas within the M25 do not have access to superfast broadband".
