The Wood Pigeon

The humble wood Pigeon (Columba palumbus) is well known to us all and particularly to the farmer whose crops are often the food of choice to this bird. This bird is the largest British pigeon, in fact the most numerous large, truly wild bird in Britain and has many regional names including Ring/ed dove, Woody (widespread), Culver (England), Cushat (Scotland), Ringdow (Essex) and Stoggy/ies (north east England). The name ring dove should not be confused with the similarly name collared dove which arrived in the 1950's.

This bird has a call that always invokes windless, warm summer days and sounds rather like somebody saying "who cooks for you"? For such a numerous bird, its nest surprisingly usually only contains a couple of eggs and consists of a shambles of twigs which is barely capable of retaining its contents.

At one time the bird was

a confirmed woodland

creature but as agricultur-

al methods changed the

advantages of living on, and indeed off the fields have turned this bird into something of a pest. It has a particular liking for the brassicaceae family which includes cauliflowheard of them being referred to as J Edgar Hoovers due their voracious appetites and there are records of shot pigeons being found with almost 200 beans or 20 small



er, cabbage, broccoli and brussel sprouts as well as beans, waste corn and the tops of turnips. However, it's diet includes nuts (pine, acorns, beech, hazel and ivy), berries and also includes some non-vegitarian items such as ants and worms. Although a very numerous bird it is their habit of dining on crops that brings them into conflict with man. I have

potatoes being present in their crops or stomachs. Having spoken of the birds destructive habits I still find it difficult to reconcile the control of a pest with the killing of animals for pleasure. Killing for food is one thing but killing for pleasure? There are farms in the local area that invite shooters in to control numbers but if the shooters where actually doing



the farms a service then clearly the farmers would be paying the shooters. In reality it's the shooters who no doubt pay the farmer for the pleasure of killing these birds – which it must be said, they are legally enabled to do. In the 1950s there were government funded culls in the early winter to reduce the population. However, the author R.K. Murton, a long time observer of the species and author of the 'The wood pigeon' demonstrated that many of the birds would have died naturally from food shortages later in the winter. An argument that was met with

much scepticism by the hunting fraternity. Although pigeons have never enjoyed the status of grouse or pheasant, the wood pigeon is considered by some to be excellent sport due to 'being wary and flying fast and high'. Personally I find this a little strange as from what I have seen the birds seem to be drawn in by very simplistic machines that have two dummy pigeons rotating round and round on sticks. Hardly behaviour that I would have called 'wary'. And if they had any sort of intelligence they would move away immediately the guns started up - howev-

er, they seem to repeatedly return to take another look at the whirling pigeons on sticks! And while I'm on the subject. the last time I was in Yorkshire I noticed magazines with names such as 'Shooting and conservation'. Sounds as if the shooting fraternity are trying to have their 'cake and eat it'! Any way, I'm sure the species has safety in numbers although why a farmer would want to have his soil peppered with steel pellets (and in years gone by with lead) is a mystery to me! Rant over!

Cannabis Factory in Chelsfield

On 29th January 2015 Bromley police found a huge cannabis factory worth £250,000 at a farmhouse in Chelsfield. Officers discovered 600 fully grown cannabis plants in an outbuilding at the secluded farmhouse A 26-year-old woman

who arrived at the property as officers searched it was arrested on suspicion of cultivating cannabis.



Bromley Balances the Budget

Bromley Council's balanced budget recommended by the Executive on 11 February was agreed at Full Council on Monday, 23 February. The Council has to save more than £60 million over four years, so nearly £9 million savings and a small increase in the Bromley element of the Council Tax were necessary to balance the 2015-16 budget.

Bromley residents will see a net increase of 1.2 per cent in their Council Tax bills. This is made up of an increase of 1.99 per cent on the Bromley element of the Council Tax and a 1.3 per cent reduction in the GLA element. The combined effect of both will equate to a £16 increase a year on a band D property, with other bands calculated pro rata.

Council Leader, Cllr Stephen Carr said: "It is regrettable that we have had to make a small increase in Council Tax this year, but this decision was not taken lightly. During our budget consultations over the past couple of years, many residents told us they

would be prepared to accept a small rise to help protect essential services. The truth is we have to do things differently as we continue to look for more efficiencies.

"Residents can be assured that we are doing everything in our power to ensure the long-term stability of the Council's finances and to spend taxpayers' money wisely. These are challenging times - as budgets contract we will all have to take more responsibility and accountability within our families and communities so we can ensure those who need our services most can get the help they require.

"Following discussions with Bromley Youth Music Trust, which ended vesterday. I am pleased we have been able to reach a joint solution. **Bromley Council has** agreed to make £153,000 of funding available to the Trust in 2015-16, as well as maintaining support, until 2017, through the provision of premises. We want to continue to support BYMT but in the current financial climate. it no longer seems appropriate to do so through the Council's revenue budget. We will continue working with BYMT to explore other sources of funding such as the Arts Council, schools and commercial sponsors.

"Despite the bleak financial outlook, we are determined to continue Building a Better Bromley. A number of achievements are in progress including the development of a multi-million pound complex at Bromley South and improvements to Bromley North Village, working with TfL to provide improvements in Beckenham, while Orpington will see a new cinema opened this year. We have maintained our track record in recycling half our waste to save landfill costs, saved more than £70,000 in electricity costs by installing modern street lighting and encouraged more than 8,000 Friends Group Members. We support carers in the borough and older people and disabled residents are helped to be as independent as possible, while our young people are encouraged to achieve their full potential. Together with sup-

Local History Group

At the start of the meeting Christine Hellicar told us about the uncertain future of Orpington Priory which houses the Bromley Museum. Further to the arti-

cle in last month's Village Voice, she informed us of the campaign to stop the sale of The Priory. A community group has been formed to take this

forward. Bromley Council has postponed their decision for 3 months. Anne Mead had arranged a petition supporting the campaign which we were



invited to sign. Some people had already signed the online version.

Paul Rason introduced his talk by reading out an extract from a Pub Spy review from a recent News Shopper. This was originally from Northern Ireland. He qualified as a barrister but at the age of 24 opened his first pub in 1979 in Muswell Hill. He named his chain after an old teacher of his in New Zealand who told him he would never succeed in

this ideal. The name "The Moon Under Water" is used by 15 pubs in all. Television screens are present but silent, making use of subtiles. The Harvest Moon opened in 1994 in premises previously occupied by Ketts



of the Harvest Moon in Orpington High Street. The reviewer's first impressions were not favourable as the entrance was crowded by smokers. The pub's High Street location allows no provision for the excluded smokers so they have to congregate on the pavement outside. The Harvest Moon is one of a chain of over 900 J D Wetherspoon pubs. This was Paul's chosen topic.

Founder Tim Martin came tion and his pubs follow

business. As is the case with our local Wetherpoon's, many pubs have the word Moon in their name. This has its roots in an essay by George Orwell, published in the Evening Standard, describing the ideal English pub as having Victorian architecture, good food, experienced bar staff and no music so that people could enjoy conversation. This pub he named "The Moon Under Water". This was Tim Martin's inspiraelectrical store.

Many Wetherspoon pubs have taken over old shop premises which results in there being no downstairs toilet facilities except for the disabled. Paul had brought along some menus for us to see. The menus are identical at all branches but the prices vary depending on location. Different days of the week have special menus which again are universal. The scale of the business enables bulk buying



economies for food and drink, and permits good beers at very competitive prices. The House of Commons has many bars and their prices are based on those at their local Wetherspoon's.

Most pubs in the chain open for breakfast at 8.00 and many are open until 11 or 12 at night. Orders are taken at the bar and delivered to numbered tables. Coffee and tea are also available at cheaper prices than the well known coffee chains. The premises are large enough to accommodate large groups without affecting other customers. The chain has a house magazine full of good news about the chain and its employees, known as associates. All staff dress the same. The chain has 33,000 employees.

During the refreshment interval we enjoyed looking at many large prints of photographs of Edwardian Bromley that Christine had rescued from the Priory as they were being discarded. Patrick displayed these along one side of the room.

Paul then went on to show us pictures of many of the pubs (taken from the internet) as he took us on an imaginary pub crawl. Some of the pubs had taken over existing pub businesses so retained their previous names but others, in old shop or office premises. were given names appropriate to the local history of the area. The individual pubs display posters of local historical interest. Starting at the Harvest Moon, the favoured moon being paired with harvest to denote the rural heritage, we proceeded to The Sovereign of the Seas in Petts Wood, This gets its name form the ship built by the local Petts family. Some of the others visited were The Tailor's Chalk in Sidcup on the former premises of a tailors and dry cleaners, The Richmal Crompton in Bromley, (Do we all remember the Just William books?), the London & Rve in Catford on the old coaching road, The Edmund Halley in Lee (the astronomer is buried nearby) and The Great Harry at Woolwich named after a ship built for HenrvVIII and built at Woolwich dockyard. Our tour included many other pubs too numerous to mention. It's a good job it was only imaginary.

Ilegal Tobacco Seizure By Trading Standards

Officers from Trading Standards in Bromley seized 5000 cigarettes from a shop in Orpington following a joint visit with the HMRC.

The tobacco products are suspected to be imported from Eastern Europe and have failed to comply with safety regulations requiring them to display health warning labels. The cigarettes have an estimated value of £1,750.

Investigations are being conducted with the owners of the business.

Cllr Tim Stevens, Executive Member for Public Protection and Safety said: "I welcome this action. It demonstrates our commitment to tackle illegal tobacco products.

Availability of these illicit products not only encourages people to keep smoking, and young people to take up the habit, but it also undermines the local economy through tax evasion. I would urge anyone who knows of shops in the

borough who sell these products to report them to Trading Standards."

Recent Accidents Along Court Road

We seem to have had a number of serious accidents along Court Road recently in the last few months. These are ones we know about, there may have been more. Is this road becoming more dangerous?

Monday afternoon 23rd February 2015,

An accident between the Warren Road / The Highway junctions. One car overturned after hitting barrier. Emergency services were called and two ambulances, two fire engines, police and the Helicopter ambulance attended. One occupant needed to be cut out by the fire brigade, a 60 year old female taken to hospital.

Saturday 14th February 2015,

Two car collision along Court Road near Park Avenue junction, Emergency services called.

Saturday afternoon 31st January 2015,

Eight people were injured in a three-car crash at the Court Road/Warren rd junction. Emergency services were called to the

scene where one car had overturned and another had struck a bollard. Two adults were taken to Kings College Hospital and two other adults and two children were treated at the scene before being taken to hospital. Two teenagers made their own way to hospital Two days earlier on

Thursday 29th January,

There was a two car collision along Park Avenue in the vicinity of the Court Road junction, where emergency services were called and the two drivers treated for minor injuries.

8th September 2014

A motorcyclist was injured when his motorcycle collided with a car at the Court Road/Warren Road junction. Emergency services were called to the scene.

22nd June 2014

At 11am there was a crash between a Land Rover and Vauxhall Meriva, happened on Court Road near the junction with The Highway. The Vauxhall Meriva ended on its roof. Emergency services including 4 ambulance crews were called to the scene, where 7 people were injured. Court Road was closed for several hours after the incident.

In the past we have tried to keep a record of local accidents along Court Road, but unless these are seen by residents, they can get cleared away very quickly, and never reported back. If any residents are aware of any road accidents in this area, could they please contact the VV with details.





Bromley Council Put Museum Closure on Hold

Local campaigners have won a temporary reprieve for the Bromley museum service and halted the sale of the borough's oldest building, the 700-year old Priory in Orpington. Last month's Village Voice gave details of Bromley Council's plans to move the museum to **Bromley Central Library** but without the funding to continue a proper museum service. The Priorv was to close and be put on the market by the end

of March.

There were protests and questions to the council from many heritage, community and educational groups and an online and paper petition has attracted over 2,000 signatures.

The Executive Committee of the council have now deferred a final decision to allow three months for consultations. It is understood there will be four strands to the consultation: heritage and collec-

tions, heritage and education, The Priory and the community and The Priory and Orpington town centre.

The Council is reminding residents who are not currently on the electoral register or have moved recently they have until **Monday 20 April** to register to have their say in the General Election

on May 7th.

Residents who haven't registered yet should also be aware registering to vote has changed.

Individual Electoral Registration (IER) requires you to register and update your details individually. No one can register for you. The new system means you can register on-line at:

www.gov.uk/register-to-vote

Once on the page you

need to fill in your name, address, date of birth and a few other details including your National Insurance number. If you don't have access to the internet or can't use it a form can be posted to you. Once registered you can vote at a polling station, by post or by proxy.

And remember it's a legal requirement to register and you can face a fine if you fail to do so.

Letter to John Peel on "Home Truths"

Home Truths BBC Radio 4 9th July 05

Dear Sir,

I am known to be a bit eccentric and have a lot of hobbies, including acting.

A few years ago I found myself in a surreal situation that could have been a disaster for the rest of the cast of Blythe Spirit, in which I was playing Mr Condomine, the lead.

It was a November late afternoon when, for some strange reason I decided to check the deep sewer manhole that lurks in the front flowerbed of or house. We had had problems with this once before when it became blocked dur to earth and roots, and it filled up to a depth of 10 feet. I could not find the manhole cover which had become covered in earth and vegetation so I got a trowel to clear it. I managed to lift the cast iron cover and peered down. All was well I was pleased to see but as I

lowered the cover I kicked the trowel down the pit, where it fell right across the exit trap down in the gloom.

There was no choice but to descend using the steel rungs set in the sides of the pit. It was about 5pm and virtually dark.

As I reached the bottom I realized that the rungs stopped short and I had to drop some five feet to pick up the trowel. As I turned to retreat I realized to my horror that I cold only just reach the first thin steel rung with my hands, let alone my foot.

At first I found this amusing but as I struggled to get my middle aged body into the contortions necessary. and stared at the darkening blue square 10 feet above my head it began to dawn on me. with increasing concern. that I was due on stage in two hours and my wife had no idea where I was! I did not have my mobile phone, which in those days may well not have worked from deep in the

earth.

After a moments panic or two I realized that the only way out was to climb, crab-like, up the walls until I cold get my feet on to a rung on the level, and hope that I had



the strength to pull myself into an pright position. It took some time and as I left the top and replaced the cover all that remained was to go indoors, tell my wife why I was late getting ready. and have a bath. I received little, if any, sympathy for this reckless act of folly either from her, or from the rest of the cast as I arrived for the first performance of Blythe Spirit! However after the show one cast member commented that my lines had been especially effluent.
