I recently spent some time with friends taking hikes around Mid-Sussex looking at villages and churches that my ancestors frequented, some back to the 1600s. One such hike led to a pub called 'The Royal Oak' in a village called Wineham. Although not definitive, there is some evidence suggesting my 3rd Gt Grandfather Thomas Knapp ran this pub in the 1820s. It is one of those pubs that make you feel like you've just gone though a time-slip back 200 years and I imaging that Thomas would instantly have recognised the place see photo.

However, the point of this intro is that during one of these walks across Mid-Sussex we found a leaf with 18 sawfly larvae munching away on it. These are not true caterpillars, the name belonging to butterflies and moths but in modern parlance the name appears to be acceptable for use with sawflies too. Like most caterpillars, these larvae only have 3 true legs which is why these bugs have a characteristic 'S' shape to

their bodies – they are only holding onto their lunch with those front legs. The rear legs are known as 'prolegs' and cannot clasp. The question arises, how did so many larvae arrive on





a single leaf at the same time. They would strip this leaf in an hour so they must have just arrived. I wonder if they had a caterpillar conga line? Each larvae following the one in front? In some species these lines have consisted of hundreds of larvae. A Victorian naturalist once tried creating a circle of larvae to see how long it would take for the leader to realise its error. They continued to march for over a week!

Anyway, onto Aaron's rod (Verbascum thapsus or Common Mullein). This year, in early spring I noticed a weed which did not look like the usual runof-the-mill thing you'd find in your garden and decided to leave it so see what it would develop into. As time drew on it became large and taller until in early summer it reached the impressive height of about 2 m (7 foot) with large spreading leaves on the lower reaches and small vellow flowers growing close to a tall central spine with smaller off-shoots (see photo). Such is the rather imposing sight of this plant that it bears the name Aaron's rod through Old Testament biblical references. Aaron was the

brother of Moses and both had sticks endowed with miraculous powers. Also, almost as miraculously, my ancestor Thomas, the pub owner mentioned above, had two grandchildren, one named Moses and the other Aaron, the latter being my Gt Grandfather. I guess my family lost its ecclesiastical inclination over the subsequent generations! One Old

Testament story tells of how on one occasion Aaron addressed the Pharaoh of Egypt and wanting to impress him threw his rod to the floor where it turned into a serpent. The Pharaoh's sorcerers then did the same with their rods to show they were not impressed but Aaron's serpent swallowed them all. The more relevant





miracle to this story is that this rod had the ability to produce buds, blossoms and bare fruit overnight. The plant has a staff like appearance allowing it to be associated with the biblical rod when in flower.

Back in Britain this plant had historical uses and prior to the introduction of cotton a white downy coating on the leaves was collected and used as candlewick or the whole plant could even be used as a flare. This is reflected by the old folk-name 'candlewick plant'. While walking in Sussex we frequently saw this plant, particularly in cemeteries while looking for long-lost ancestors. The plant is biennial although I did not

notice it the previous year despite growing vegetable in the very same patch. The tall spike like structure of the plant is not present in the first year as only a low rosette is arown – in a similar manner to parsnips. The plant is mildly poisonous but is a favourite of a moth that shares its more common name: the Mullein Moth. This moth. when not flying looks like a piece of splintered wood so I would have thought it looks fairly obvious while feeding on its name-sake. So much for adaptive evolution.

While researching this piece I found that D H Lawrence had written a lesser known book by the title "Aaron's rod" in 1922 which follows the exploits of an Englishman travelling in Europe after WW1 with his flute hence Aaron's rod. Many reviews were not complimentary so unless vou're a huge Lawrence fan, probably best to miss this one out but I did wonder if the book name was mere coincidence or whether he was thinking of the plant. He was bought up in Nottingham close to the countryside. had friends that lived on a farm and an appreciation of the natural world for his entire life so it's not unreasonable to think that he knew of this wild plant that was so conspicuous due to its size alone.

A combination of factors has brought about this decision. Steve's health is not too good and is unable to get about easily, cost of fertiliser has gone up 70%, chemicals, to try and keep the crop clean, have risen about 20%, diesel doubled in price, and the weather has made the cost of production out weigh the income. As you can imagine, this has been a very, very difficult decision and we have tried all ways to avoid this but we cannot continue losing





money.

The whole farm has now been planted with grass for hay and haylage which will be sold through a merchant but at least we are still farming, just. Does odd report. Thank you to anyone want a combine? Needless to say we have the combine, trailers and

drill for sate, it will be heartbreaking when they qo.

We will not be writing to you all regularly now but obviously will send in the all the readers who often tell us how much they enjoy reading the farm

news. Will finish as usual with a weather quote but just to say that a couple of swallows are still flving around and thrilled to see a lesser white throat in the garden recently. Tawny owls have been calling too. No sign of the weasel though.

October usually is a month of falling leaves and falling temperatures, when the first black ice of winter can appear. A large number of foggy days in October indicates a hard winter. If the leaves wither on the branches in late autumn. instead of beginning to fall in October as normal, an extra cold winter is due.

Panic Buying – Why do we do it?

As I write this month, Petrol Stations in the local area are empty, queues of over an hour form when there is a tanker delivery and the situation seems serious.

The government are insisting that there is plenty of fuel and that it is only the distribution that is a problem but this has not stopped a rush of panic buying and chaos on the roads and around the petrol stations. If the government are telling the truth then there is absolutely no need for all this chaos.

Supply chains are based on predicted behaviour and if we had not decided to go and panic buy then there would be enough fuel for everyone but we just can't seem to stop ourselves from doing it. Think about toilet rolls last year! Why actually makes us panic buy?

Psychotherapist Nick Blackburn said people are trying to "solve" their anxiety by buying supplies, but when they get to the pumps, they're likely to experience more anxiety because items are running low. Then there's the added stress of being criticised or hearing snarky comments by others for doing it - in the forecourt or all over social media. "That's not the way to make fearful people feel better," Blackburn told HuffPost UK

Hansa Pankhaniaa therapist of 25 years and <u>member of the British</u> <u>Association for</u> <u>Counselling and</u>

Psychotherapy (BACP). believes panic buying is also driven by helplessness, fear and loss of control. When people panic-buy it's a 'gesture", she said they're doing something to help themselves in an otherwise helpless situation. When we have no control over the biager picture, we crave control in our "micro world" – our home and daily routines. And in this case, people are doing it by buying up supplies.

So, the message: avoid panic buying but try not to scroll or share scaremongering posts on social media either. In the next few weeks only buy fuel if you are really going to need it and hopefully supplies will return to normal.

Bromley Trading Standards is promoting the new phone number which connects consumers directly to their bank to check calls are genuine. 159 is a pilot scheme set up by banks and telephone companies who want to fight fraud.

If you think someone is trying to trick you into handing over money or your personal details ...

Stop! | Hang up | Call 159 to speak directly to your bank

- use a different phone if you can or wait a good while or call a friend, to ensure the phone line is clear

When calling 159, you'll be taken through an option menu in which each bank that has signed up to the service is read aloud. Customers are then able to use their telephone keypad to be put through to their bank.

For those who bank with firms not yet involved in the 159 pilot - you should continue to contact your bank by using the number on the back of your bank card.

#### When to call 159:

- Someone calls you saying they are from your bank even if they are not suspicious.
- ✓ You receive a call asking you to transfer money or make a payment even if it seems genuine
- You receive a call about a financial matter and it seems suspicious.

159 will never call you. Only a fraudster will object to you calling 159
